From the Rav...

SEEING THE TZADDIK IN THE RASHA

Reb Levi Yitzchak Berditchiver had a remarkable way of dealing with difficult people and difficult situations. It seems that no matter what anyone did, no matter what anyone said, Reb Levi Yitzchak was able to give the situation a positive spin and to see the other side of the coin. One Pesach, Reb Levi Yitzchak's patience was to be tested in a way that it had never been tested before.

There was a young man in Berditchev who had stopped keeping mitzvos. That year, during the *Seder*, as this young man's family prepared to eat the matzas mitzva, the wayward young man, to everyone's shock, pulled a piece of bread out of his pocket. There was a tumult of crying and yelling while all the while the young man could be heard taunting, "We're hungry after Haggadah, aren't we? Matza, Chametz, who cares. Rabbi Levi Yitzchak, the great tzaddik, wouldn't mind, would he?" His parents, upon hearing the evil words that accompanied the evil actions, threw on their coats and ran to Reb Levi Yitzchak. The young man, possessed by the malevolence of his actions, followed behind.

"Rebbe," the parents cried as soon as they burst into Reb Levi Yitzchak's *Seder*, "Rebbe, our son is a *rasha*. Our son is an evil person. Help us. Help us." Reb Levi Yitzchak, after attempting to offer some comfort to the broken parents, proceeded to inquire as to what exactly had happened. In-between sobs, the parents told the sad story of a wayward son who kept pushing the envelope of communal rejection further and further.

Reb Levi then turned to the boy and asked him: "Iz es takke ozoi, is it true?" The boy's insolence displayed itself even in front of Reb Levi. "Yes, it is. Yes, I eat bread on Pesach. I don't keep the mitzvos anymore.

Why should I keep on making believe that I do?"

The only sound that could be heard within the deathly silence was the sound of parental weeping. "Kum aher," Reb Levi Yitzchak beckoned the boy. The boy was suddenly unsure of himself. Perhaps he had gone too far, after all? But he listened to Reb Levi Yitzchak and approached the table. Reb Levi Yitzchak hugged him. "Such a good boy," he exclaimed to the father, "Such honesty. He doesn't lie. He doesn't dissemble. He tells the truth. Such an honest boy! He can teach me a thing or two! Would it be okay if he enhances my Seder table tonight?" Reb Levi asked the stunned parents. "Just one condition though, one very small condition." he said as he seated the boy at the head of the table: "At our Seder, no bread, is that okay?."

It's our story, isn't it? All children, and, for that matter, all adults, make their share of mistakes. And yes, when children make mistakes, they need to be set right, a lesson must be learned.

But disciplinary action may never take place in a vacuum. The focus cannot be on the *chametz* exclusively, on that which has gone awry and on that which needs to be corrected. Discipline must begin with an appreciation, as it invariably can, if we are open to taking note of it, of that which is right and of that which is good. May that message carry from Pesach to the rest of the year and to the rest of our lives.
