Message From the Rav ...

PARSHAS BALAK

TO BLESS YOURSELF OR TO CURSE YOUR ENEMY?

"And he (Balak, the king of Moav) sent messengers to Bilam saying go curse for me the Jewish people, for they are stronger than me and I will drive them out of the land" (*Bamidbar* 22,5-6).

Balak, the king of Moav, was afraid. The kelal visrael that had just vanguished two of the ancient Near East's most powerful empires was now perched like a looming nightmare on Moav's border. And so, Moav circled its wagons and attempted to defend home and hearth by calling upon Bilam to curse kelal yisrael. The Torah, though, looks at Moav's seemingly sensible attempt at self-defence and finds incorrigible fault. The fault, it is there for all to see: "A Moavite (who converts) may not join the Assembly of Hashem (to marry a Jew), even after ten generations because they hired Bilam to curse you" (Devarim 23, 4-5). The evil of the Moavite curse is so great that the Moavite people are blemished forevermore.

Is the fault so terrible? Is a king who protects his people from an invading force evil? Is an attempt at self-defence so unforgivable?

No, self-defence is neither terrible, nor is it unforgivable. But if you read the pesukim carefully, you will notice that the Moavite focus was not on self-defence. Had their focus been on self-protection, Moav would not have been cursing kelal yisrael but would, instead, have been blessing themselves. That is what a people seeking self-protection does: It improves and it blesses its own forces. But instead of strengthening itself, the Moavites attempted to undermine their enemies.

Such negativism, such a small-minded focus on destroying the other, rather than strengthening the self is indicative of a character flaw of frightening dimensions. This negativism might be deeply imbedded in the national psyche of the Moavite people; it might very well be the prime reason for the Torah's distancing of the Moavite convert.

The Moavites are not the only ones who are faced with challenges, are they? We all confront challenges, all the time. Competitions for a promotion at work, for an award at school are part and parcel of everyday life. When such challenges and competitions arise, what approach do we take? Do we bless ourselves by putting our best foot forward and by trying our hardest? Or do we demean ourselves by cursing and disparaging our competitor? Remember that disparaging the other is reminiscent of the Moavite approach. Such disparagement did not serve the Moavites well in earlier times; it will most assuredly not be of much benefit to us today.

SHUL GENERAL NEWS

EXECUTIVE UPDATE

The first meeting of the 2007/08 Executive took place on Monday June 25th, 2007. Nadine Bressler and Dr. Jack Sandler were invited to the meeting to address the Executive.

Nadine raised Sisterhood issues such as funding for Sisterhood events, immediate need for a mechitza solution, safety of shul playground equipment and clear access for women to the staircases. Executive members, Norm Weisbart and Manuel Kanner volunteered to research a feasible mechitza solution compatible specifically for our shul's current structure. This has been established as a high priority item.

The issue of boys and young men congregating on the stairs to the women's section was quite disturbing. This causes many women to feel uncomfortable as they climb the stairs and could be quite dangerous in the event of an emergency. The Executive decided that effective immediately the staircases leading to the women's section are to remain clear at all times, and the boys and young men currently congregating on the steps will be asked to refrain from doing so. An announcement to this effect will be made from the pulpit; fathers will be asked to monitor their sons and, if necessary, a

committee will be set up to enforce the situation.

Jack presented his proposal regarding emergency preparedness within the shul including the requirement for emergency medical resuscitation equipment (i.e. defibrillator), supplies (i.e. readily accessible emergency box containing items for establishing intravenous and airway access as well as suitable medications) and Advanced Cardiac Life Support training courses for interested members particularly physicians and dentists within the congregation. The Executive approved the proposal and requested that he begin to source out his recommended model and report his findings back to Senior Executive for approval. This has been established as a high priority item.

- House update (air conditioning components have been ordered)

- Yeshiva University Summer Kollel Program update (see article elsewhere in this newsletter)
- Scheduling of upcoming Executive meeting for 2007/2008 (meetings to be held the last Monday of each month)

SDEROT CAMPAIGN



פיקוח נפש דוחה את הכל SAVING A LIFE IN DANGER SUPERCEDES ALL ELSE

Due to the *chesed* and generosity of the members of the shul, Clanton Park Synagogue has raised about 90% of the sufficient funds required (\$36,000 USD) for the purchase of a badly needed transportable bomb shelter through **Operation Lifeshield**, for immediate deployment in Sderot.

Currently there are not enough permanent shelters available and not enough time or funds to build more. Operation LifeShield shelters are built to safely prevent the penetration of bullets, shrapnel and missile fragmentation, as well as injury from explosion concussion and shock waves. They can also withstand a direct hit of some missiles. The shelters are freestanding above ground units that can hold up to 30 people in an air raid emergency. They are approved by the IDF Home Front Command.

Together we can feel that we have contributed to fulfilling our obligation of saving the lives in jeopardy in Sderot by providing the funds for the purchase of an emergency prefab bomb shelter.

This week the process began of sending the funds already collected as efforts continue to raise the remaining funds.

A plaque will be affixed to the shelter acknowledging that Clanton Park Synagogue has provided the funding for the the purchase of the shelter but a decision has yet to be made in whose memory it will be dedicated.

Are We Religious?

The Oxford English Dictionary defines "religious" as "pious", "devout" or "exhibiting the spiritual or practical effects of religion". "Pious" comes from the Latin meaning "dutiful". "Devout" suggests earnest faith. Neither term is terribly helpful in determining if I or someone else is religious. If someone has earnest faith and is in some fashion dutiful, is he religious?

Traditional Judaism follows Jewish law, Halacha. If a person observes Halacha, is he or she religious? On one level, the answer is "Yes". The answer to the question, "Are you religious", to Orthodox Jews, would be, "Yes, I'm kosher and shomer Shabbos and shomer mitzvos". I don't know if anyone has answered that question by saying, "Yes, I'm honest and caring" or in some other way that is not tied to Halacha.

What about the third OED definition, "exhibiting the spiritual or practical effects of religion"? What are the practical or spiritual effects of religion? Knowledge can be cited as a practical effect of religious training and upbringing. If that is the case, then we can proudly claim that there is a very great deal of knowledge of sources amongst Jews and, in particular, observant Jews. Although that knowledge has become narrowed almost exclusively to Talmud in recent years, there is no doubt that Orthodox Jews are conversant in the basic texts.

Observance would be another practical effect of religious training. Orthodox Jews go to davening, keep kosher and maintain other Halachic obligations dutifully and often even earnestly.

Are conduct and attitude "practical or spiritual effects of religion"? If one is to conduct oneself in a specific way, or to think in a certain manner, what is that? Everyone knows of Avraham's "chesed" and Moshe's humility, to use only two of the best known examples of "midos", but are these traits ideal models to emulate or religious obligations? Can we be religious without demonstrating "chesed" or being humble?

Are Pirke Avos pieces of wisdom to be studied and meditated on during long summer afternoons or somehow more than that? What exactly does it mean when it says, "Despise not any man and discard not any thing, for there is not a man that has not his hour and there is not any thing that has not its place"? What is a religious Jew supposed to do with this powerful statement?

Yecheskel reports the words of Hashem:

Behold this was the iniquity of thy sister Sedom: she and her daughters had pride, surfeit of bread, and abundance of idleness, and yet she did not strengthen the hand of the poor and needy. And they were haughty, and committed abomination before me: therefore I removed them when I saw it.

What practical or spiritual effects or obligations does that declaration hold for me and my community? What is the relationship between religion and these evocative and challenging examples and texts? Can Jews be religious without in some way incorporating them into our personal and communal lives? If we need to take them into account, then, how?

I am reminded of Mark Twain's injunction that "To be good is noble; but to show others how to be good is nobler and no trouble". It is certainly no trouble to read and discuss Halachic and non-Halachic texts – it is even stimulating – but exactly how is it religious?

It is proudly proclaimed that there are possibly more people studying Jewish

sources today throughout the world than at any time in history. That may well be true, with the institution of Daf Yomi, Artscroll translations of all kinds, and the stunningly successful re-emergence of a vibrant Orthodoxy.

Yet, amidst all of this excellent endeavour, is there any leadership addressing the issue of the meaning of this study for the individual? I do not refer here to "mussar", for that is important but limited in its appeal and its audience. There is a new, young, sophisticated generation – some frum from birth, some new or relatively new to serious

Jewish study – growing up in a decadent, secular culture. Most must live a double life, studying and working in contact with the world all the while immersing themselves in traditional Judaism.

Who is telling them how to navigate those difficult waters and what the "spiritual or practical effects of religion" are supposed to be in their everyday lives? Some choose a cloistered life far from the madding crowd – ultra-Orthodox enclaves in America or Israel – but most do not live that life. The rest are left to their own devices to reconcile tradition and modernity. Where is the Jewish leadership to guide, nurture and work in a profoundly engaging and enlightened way with the future of Yiddishkeit?
